# SEND judgement on Wiltshire services and support is published

"Children and young people with SEND are valued and prioritised in Wiltshire."

That's the opinion of government inspectors who visited Wiltshire to check services for families with children and young people with SEND.

"The judgement by inspectors means we're one of only five local authorities to have received the top grade inspection for SEND and also an 'Outstanding' Ofsted result for our work with families and children in the last four years."

Wiltshire was recently visited by Care Quality Commission and Ofsted government inspectors to check services for families with

children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) in Wiltshire. They looked at the whole Local Area Partnership which includes education, health, social care, alternative provision, and more.

The inspection involved speaking to professionals, families, and other organisations involved in SEND, including the Wiltshire Parent Carer Council.

The report highlights how partnership working in Wiltshire is incredibly positive, and collaborative working has helped to improve services. This includes the collective voice of children, young people and their families. The report also helpfully identifies areas that Wiltshire needs to continue to improve and the WPCC will continue to work in partnership across the Local Area to ensure that parent carers remain fundamental to strengthening services for all families of children and young people with SEND.

### Wiltshire Consultation on Proposed Changes to Funding for EHC Plans

The current EHCP funding system was introduced in 2016, and it has not been changed since. Wiltshire Council is therefore seeking feedback on how to better align funding with students' needs, create a simpler and fairer funding process, and ensure that special schools and Resource Bases receive sufficient support.

The Council's consultation is aimed at improving how funds are allocated to schools, proposes changes to how EHCP funding is decided and how needs are described, so that the LA can be confident that children and young people are receiving the support they need.

### **SEND Small Grants Scheme**

Wiltshire Council has invited groups, organisations and individuals to apply for grants of up to £10k to help increase the number of opportunities and activities across Wiltshire for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and or Disabilities (SEND).

The grants can be used to buy items such as materials or equipment needed or increase the number of things they need to start a club or activity for children and people with SEND.

Deadline for submissions is Midday 6 January 2025.

Applications will be assessed in January 2025.

The small grants scheme was established following parental feedback and aims to create more opportunities for children and young people with SEND in their local communities, providing greater access to clubs, activities and other groups.

The approach is aligned to the council's business plan to ensure children and young people have the best start in life and to provide opportunities for all young people to engage in wider society and the council.

### New Early Help SEND Team

We have a new team at Wiltshire Council working in SEND. The Early Help SEND Team will work with families, wider education and skills, education providers and other agencies to identify children and young people with SEND and work with them and their families as they access the right support to meet their needs.

The Early Help SEND team worker will attend the Discussion and Decision (DAD) meeting which decides what support is needed for a young person with SEND. This can be a range of support or in some cases an Education Health and Support Plan (EHCP). The Early Help SEND worker will be there to ensure families are fully informed about available support and guide them through the process of accessing the services they need.





### IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

The Marlborough and District Dyslexia Association is now joining forces with the Wiltshire Dyslexia Association to continue to work together towards providing information and events to inform and empower dyslexics and their families in the future.

### Susanne Harris (MDDA) writes:

The MDDA was set up by a group of parents and teachers who recognised a gap in provision for dyslexic children and adults and wanted to 'encourage the identification and to advance the education of people affected by dyslexia'.



The Inaugural Meeting was held in held in January 1988. In the early days the MDDA held two annual dyslexia-related lectures which were extremely well attended – mainly by parents, teachers and adult dyslexics. A helpline gave support and signposted members of the public to professionals as necessary. The Association kept a good stock of quality books and educational games for the public to borrow free of charge. A monthly 'surgery' was held at the local library.

Over the years the MDDA changed to meet the criteria of its members and lectures were replaced with workshops from experts, which included how to support children with appropriate strategies in literacy and maths. The MDDA ran free training days in conjunction with Wiltshire Council's Specialist SEN Service, for teachers and teaching assistants.

Wiltshire Council then set up the Wiltshire Dyslexia Support Group (DSG) which comprises Wiltshire SSENS, Wiltshire Dyslexia Association, MDDA and Wiltshire Parent Carer Council. The group has worked together to arrange an annual event at County Hall to mark Dyslexia Awareness Month, and other events across the county to improve dyslexia support across schools in Wiltshire.

Most importantly, Wiltshire Council is supporting Wiltshire Schools to achieve the British Dyslexia Association's Dyslexia Friendly Quality Mark for Education

13 schools have achieved this award, and 15 further schools are being supported by SSENS to achieve this quality mark: <u>Dyslexia Friendly Schools June 2024 update - Local Offer</u>

# BDA response to the Curriculum and Assessment review call for evidence



The British Dyslexia Association (BDA) is pleased to be able to submit a response to the Curriculum & Assessment Review Call for Evidence. This is an important review which will hopefully lead to positive changes for children with dyslexia and dyscalculia, many of whom struggle to fully access the National Curriculum and are disadvantaged by the current assessment system. Around 10 per cent of pupils are dyslexic, meaning three in every classroom.

Our response focuses on evidence to support the experience and needs of those learners with dyslexia and dyscalculia accessing the National Curriculum and its assessment pathways. We have focused our response to those sections and questions which directly relate to learners with dyslexia or dyscalculia - section 3 on social justice and inclusion, and section 4 on ensuring an excellent foundation in maths and English.

Our key observations, concerns and recommendations are set out below. You can see our full response <u>here</u>.

### Social events can be uniquely challenging. We can help.

Going to parties, crowded spaces, or formal events can be challenging for families. <u>Learn strategies</u> to help ease everyone's anxieties and make events go as smoothly as possible.

### Help kids feel comfortable in their clothes.

Formal clothing might be a must for certain services and ceremonies. But some kids have sensory challenges that make it hard for them to get through events while wearing clothes that are stiff, tight, or scratchy.

### Consider bringing distractions and stress relievers.

Your child may have to sit longer than they're used to. Or be in situations that feel overwhelming and uncomfortable. Support your child by bringing small, quiet toys or tools for them to play with. <u>Fidget tools</u>, colouring books, and stress balls can be helpful distractions.

### Have an exit plan.

Sometimes, no matter what you do, events just get to be too much. It can help your own stress if you think ahead of time about how you'll react to certain situations.

### Practice and set expectations.

Some events can put kids (and you) out of their comfort zones. Before you go, talk together about the event. Let them know what to expect — the location, if it'll be noisy or crowded, and who will be there.

### Prepare for unfamiliar foods.

Food can be a big part of many events. Your child may be offered food they've never tried before. Or meals prepared differently than they're used to. Many kids have <u>food</u> sensitivities, aversions, or allergies.

### Be kind to yourself.

It can be tough when you have expectations for an event, and then it goes differently. Maybe you prepared so carefully, but something still caught you off-guard. You might feel let down or disappointed. Your feelings are valid, too.

You're being a great parent by setting your child up for success. Even if things didn't go as planned, remember: You're doing your best. Your child can feel when you're on their team.

After events, you and your child may each need to decompress. Think of ways to relax (together or independently). Put on a good movie, eat a comfort meal, or take a long bath. You deserve it.

### Dyslexia: a new definition, a new era?

It is a momentous time in the dyslexia world. For the first time in dyslexia's almost 150 years of history, multiple stake holders found consensus on a new definition of this condition which has caused controversy for as many years.

In this blog, I outline how dyslexia's turbulent past has influenced the present, with reference to the resilience of dyslexia's advocates (especially mothers). For me, the new definition is a positive marker of how far we have come in both agreement and understanding.

I have been thinking about this a lot!

Why do we have conditions like dyslexia, ADHD, and autism in the population and why do they persist?

I think they can be partly explained by several genetic and evolutionary considerations. However, society has often viewed people who vere away from the societal norm through a lens of deficits as we didn't always fit into the expectations of how to act, communicate or think.

We have designed for the past 100 years education and employment taking technical principles for its design. This was having a system which allowed us to provide a means of delivery for bulk education and bulk approaches to recruitment. This design then favoured certain 'shapes of people' who were able to thrive into these systems. If you could sit still, write neatly, remember facts you did well.

# How to support a child with dyslexia to discover their strengths - JKP Blog

**How to support a child with dyslexia to discover their strengths.** Margaret Rooke is the author of <u>Meet the Dyslexia Club!</u> and the parent of a dyslexic daughter.



If our children seem to be struggling with reading, writing and spelling, it's all too easy to fill our minds with fears about their future. A large dose of anxiety can so often feel like something that lands uninvited on our doorstep when we become parents.

The truth is that our children will also have talents and skills, though we may not have taken in how significant these are.

It can feel so tempting to focus on what we hope will help them get through their spelling tests and SATS but, as well as their schoolwork, it's vital to encourage them to pay attention to what comes easily to them.

These are the aspects of life that they are obviously motivated to do. We all – young and old – have strengths. We need to encourage these in our children, giving them time and space to develop and to feel good about themselves, now and in the future. Some of these strengths are thought to come naturally to those with dyslexia.

I spoke to a lot of young children for my latest book, Meet The Dyslexia Club! The Amazing Talents, Skills and Everyday Life of Children with Dyslexia. I asked them what they most wanted from the adults around them.

"Let me do more of what I enjoy, like looking after animals,' said one. 'Look out for what we're good at and encourage us to do that,' said another. 'Have some fun with us,' said a third.

When children did mention help with schoolwork, they were very specific:

'Help me read the things that interest me, like football match reports and instructions for games,' and, 'Give us loads of time to finish what we're doing. Understand we're going as quickly as we can.'

If you're concerned about how your children are doing at school, of course it's important to make time to talk to your child's teacher and work out together what can be done to help.

However, it's vital to remember that those elements of life they excel at naturally may not be covered by the school curriculum, but they may help them flourish in the world of work after they leave.

So how do we inspire our children to do their very best in those areas they love?

- Encourage them to spend time on their hobbies. This will help them find ways to increase their knowledge and skillset.
- Their talents can be obvious, like being good at art or sport. They can be hobbies or
  personality traits it's easy to take for granted anything from being a natural and
  contented cook, to being a kind, trustworthy and understanding friend, or letting
  their minds run free as a storyteller. In fact all of these can lead to different careers,
  from being a chef to being a counsellor.
- Look out for personality traits, like the ability to stay focused on a task or understanding the importance of compromise – both so important in many lines of work.
- When you spot these strengths, talk about them with your child. Observe the specifics of what they're good at and talk about these to encourage them further.
- Give yourself credit for what comes naturally to you as a successful adult, all those qualities that enable you to live a rounded life. Remember, our children so often copy what they see us do, not what we ask them to do.
- Have fun with your children. Allow them to forget about life's difficulties, helping them to bring these into perspective.
- And together take a look at Meet The Dyslexia Club! The Amazing Talents, Skills and Everyday Life of Children with Dyslexia. This is a book based on the words of young children. As these children explore the talents and skills they've spotted in themselves, your own child will be encouraged to identify similar strengths within themselves. Together you can recognise ways they can shine.



### LETTERS TO SANTA

Read and act out the play with your child so they know their part and where their lines appear in the play.



Record lines onto a mobile device so that they can listen to the words, as well as reading them from the script.



Don't worry if they're not word perfect. Teachers are always on hand to support on the night, and the audience never notice anyway!

### LEARNING WORDS FOR CHRISTMAS CAROLS **AND SONGS**



Christmas carols are full of unfamiliar words and can be tricky to read. It can be helpful to learn the words off by heart so that your child doesn't have to rely on decoding them as they sing. Here are some hints and tips to help your child navigate a school carol service or

- Ask school for a copy of the songs that your child will be singing. Read them through together and help with any tricky words.
- Find Youtube videos or websites where you can listen to the songs. Many of these have words appearing on the screen. This multi-sensory approach of seeing and hearing the words can help with learning and committing the words to memory.
- Play the carols and songs in the car and at home and sing along so that your child has many opportunities for these to be embedded into their memory.

# 10 ways to create an Inclusive Festive Classroo

The festive season brings many changes to the school environment which can be overwhelming for many autistic children and young people.



Autistic learners can feel very unsettled with changes to their environment – consider adding festive decorations to the classroom gradually



Create 'decoration-free zones' accessible to autistic students to spend time in if they need to



Increased levels of excited noise may be uncomfortable for autistic pupils. Make sure they have access to resources such as ear defenders and fidget/stim toys to help support self-regulation



Allow for more frequent breaks for quiet 'alone-time' and/or sensory calming breaks to support emotional and sensory regulation



Give advanced warning of any festive changes to the usual daily routine, timetable and school processes



Give a copy of your festive timetable to your autistic students to have in advance at home so they can prepare for any new events each day with family support




Consider using visual aids such as a calendar and a timetable to show when planned festive events will happen



'Christmas lunch' may be a welcome menu change, but brings new canteen smells. Allow autistic pupils access to a separate eating space if they prefer







If you're planning a festive dressing up day (eg. Christmas jumpers), be aware that autistic pupils may be sensitive to changes to clothing. Give advance notice, and consider the use of visual aids to help explain what changes might look like.



This is an example list and should not be regarded as comprehensive. Reasonable adjustments should be based on the profile of the autistic child or young person you are working with.




### This is a great game for practising phonics and word building.





A learning difficulty specific to writing.

### Symptoms:

- Cramped grip, sore hand.
- Poor spacial planning of sentences & margins.
- Frequent erasing.
- Inconsistent letter & word spacing.
- Poor spelling, missing words/letters.

## DYSLEXIA:

A learning difficulty specific to reading.




**Pamela Tomalin** left school at 15 with no qualifications but used her practical skills to establish an international interior design and manufacturing business, which she ran until 2018. In 1999, she returned to education, despite not knowing she was dyslexic, and earned a Level 4 qualification in 'Information Advice and Guidance Practitioner' and a Diploma in Management Studies from the University of Northampton. She also completed a BDA Level 4 qualification as a Workplace Needs Assessor.

Pam has been involved with dyslexia advocacy since 2010, serving as Chair of the Northamptonshire & Buckinghamshire Dyslexia Association. In 2014, she joined the British Dyslexia Association (BDA) Management Board as a Local Association Trustee, a role she held until 2023. She actively volunteered at conferences and events, contributing her time and expertise to BDA initiatives.

Pam's career also includes accomplishments outside of dyslexia advocacy. She was a founding member of the Federation of Small Businesses in 1974 and contributed to the development of Business Link in 1999. Additionally, she worked as a Princes' Trust Advisor and successfully delivered a Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) contract for the 'Training for Work' program. Drawing on her experience as an Adult Careers Advice Practitioner and Skills Coach, Pam created and delivered a European Social Fund pilot program to help unemployed individuals with dyslexia find employment. She also secured funding for two local training programs for parents of dyslexic children. Partnering with the Peterborough Dyslexia Association, she organised sessions on reading, writing, spelling, homework, working with schools, and assistive technology.

As a Matrix Champion, Pam trained helpline volunteers and led her team to achieve the prestigious DfE Matrix Standard Quality Framework Award for their Information, Advice, and Guidance services. Recognising declining support for Local Dyslexia Associations, Pam organised a successful conference with the BDA. It featured sessions for educators and parents, filling 300 seats and increasing membership. The event's success led her to replicate the format in other regions, including Peterborough and Cambridge, strengthening dyslexia support efforts.

## <u>Keira Knightley says daughter has dyslexia and reflects on her own struggles with condition | The Standard</u>

<u>Keira Knightley</u>, who has battled <u>dyslexia</u> since she was six, has revealed that her daughter has also been diagnosed with the condition.

The 39-year-old actress discussed her methods for memorising lines and shared how her daughter's approach mirrors her own.


She shared: "I still find sight-reading really hard. It really bounces [the text], but I record it and listen to it over and over. That's how I learn it.

"Now, we have a dyslexic kid, and she's doing the same thing. Her memory is absolutely amazing."

Knightley and her husband, former Klaxons singer <u>James Righton</u>, 40, have two daughters—Edie, eight, and Delilah, four.

While Knightley didn't specify which child has the language-based learning disability, the couple marveled at their daughter's ability to memorise books.

Speaking on the <u>Ruthie's Table 4 podcast</u>, they said: "She'll look at books and would have memorised the book, and it's amazing."



**James Lamont**, co-screenwriter of Paddington in Peru, proves that dyslexia does not **stop creativity.** Despite struggling with reading and spelling as a child, he says with the right support, anyone can achieve their dreams—like writing movies!

James told the BBC, "It is a different way of learning and once you have those tools, you can learn just as well as anybody else ...as I went on, you realise that those skills don't stop you being creative or stop you being able to get your ideas across on a page. That is something that I say to a lot of the kids at my children's school - does a writer need to know how to spell?"
